David Wall an active Field Director working in the interests of the Barn Dance Hall of Fame was largely responsible for this activity.

The Bill Bramah show was produced at the home of Earl and Martha Heywood and presented on Global Television on January 18, 1995. Bramah talked about the Memorabilia and was aware of the popularity of Canada's Largest Travelling Barn Dance, and how the fans called it the Grand Ole Opry of Canada.

CBC FORSES MAJOR TOURIST ATTRACTION

When CBC - FM Radio Reporter Floyd Herman learned, there was an official Fund Raising Campaign under way, for another Major Tourist Attraction, for Western Ontario, he lost no time tracking down the story. He immediately contacted the office of the Barn Dance Hall of Fame, inWingham, Ontario and learned the plans were already on the drawing board for a Hall of Fame. A centre for the Arts for Music, entertainment and much more. Floyd presented a very informative story on the project which was broadcast over CBC - FM Radio network on Thursday morning, January 26, 1995.

The results of these broadcasts drew a series of inquiries including contributions, one of which was from Lloyd Acheson a Fuller Brush Representative, well known throughout Ontario and now living in Gananoque, Ontario.

Lloyd and his good wife Gladys have now become Honorary Founding Members of The Barn Dance Hall of Fame. If it were feasable to move a Barn they have on their property they would donate it for the Museum. Thank You Lloyd and Gladys!




