1st Annual Jamboree Campout Weekend Success

The date was May 22, 23 and 24, 1998, the setting was the Blyth Arena Complex. Originally envisioned as an experimental membership drive for the Barn Dance Historical Society, it became probably, the social event of the season for many of our members. The success was great enough to ensure it as an annual event to kick off the Barn Dance season. It took a tremendous amount of effort and time for a lot of our people to make it the success it was, and for this they must be commended. It was all volunteer work for the organizers, workers, musicians, etc.

Friday night was set aside for campers to arrive and set up, which they did. Saturday morning started off with a free continental breakfast, which brought some of the campers out to the arena at 9:00 a.m. for some serious socializing. Registration for the open jamboree started at 10:00 a.m. Jamboree time at 1:00 p.m. saw a substantial list of performers for the afternoon jam session, everybody had a chance to do his thing, there were

fiddlers, singers, bluegrassers, you name it, we had it.

Saturday night at 8:00 p.m. was Barn Dance time, and the people came. Playing the role of Johnny Brent as MC was Eric Coates, reprising the role he played in Blyth Theatre's "BARN DANCE LIVE" for the past two seasons. Partway through the show he introduced Jim Swan to the audience as the regular MC for the season. Jim, a former CKNX personality, now based in London gave us a sample of what we can expect for the rest of the season, a welcome addition to the show. The Barn Dance Band was there to give expert backing to the traditional artists as usual, with the only change in their lineup being Grant Heywood on drums. Len Love and Al Widmeyer of the Country Versatiles were on hand to lead the All-Star Band, the rest of the Country Versatiles were elsewhere. fulfilling commitment.

A lot of great gospel music was laid on the audience who did their share of singing along and hand-clapping, a great end to a great weekend.

The Editor Speaks



How Well Do You Know Your Barn Dance?

Hey, we have a winner for the contest this time. Winner of the CD and calendar is John Becker of Kitchener. It's still been a bit of a disappointment, as we only had one entry and I thought this one would be fairly easy. The young man in question was ROY THOMPSON, and you'll find him singing on "It's The Saturday Night Barn Dance, Vol. 2" which has just been released. Roy was a popular entertainer in the Kitchener area where he sang with The Westernaires. It was with this band that he first appeared on the CKNX Barn Dance. Also in the Westernaires at that time was Lloyd Bank on steel guitar. It was in 1948, and probably the first time for a steel guitar to be heard on the show. It wasn't long until Lloyd became a regular Barn Dance musician.

In 1951, Roy himself left the Westernaires to take a regular spot on the Barn Dance. At that time, he had built and was operating The WagonWheel, his first of a number of restaurants in the Kitchener area. His voice was forever stilled with his passing in 1987.

Barn Dance in an early version of the Barn Dance Gang with Earl Heywood in the late 40's. A vocalist and guitarist who later moved to Kitchener to operate a guitar school out of the Paul Berg Music Centre. Come on now and get your thinking cap on and get some entries in. "It's The Saturday Night Barn Dance, Vol. 2"

FLASH!! Vol. 2 of "It's The Saturday Night Barn Dance" has just been released by Rodeo Records through Holborne Distributing in Newmarket. Excellent sales of Volume One last year made possible the release of Vol. 2. Once again we've dug out some excellent gems of years gone by of the Barn Dance, this time as far back as 1947, 51 years ago. Here's a rundown of what you can expect from the 27 cuts, actually there are 29 as two of them have 2 numbers together, again 1 hour and ten minutes of nostalgia.

This time we located an original opening of the Barn Dance, from a 1963 show, with Johnny Brent opening the Barn Dance to Down Yonder by Rossie Mann and The Ranch Boys, followed by Rossie doing Mississippi Sawyer. From this introduction you can see why Johnny Brent was such an excellent MC for the show throughout the years.

Then we have Bruce Robertson doing a brand new recording of Any Dream Will Do. Bruce was a member of the Ranch Boys throughout most of the 50's, and here is the retired school teacher with the only recording he's ever made, excellent job.

Followed by the late Bill Mankiss with Tico-Tico, I can remember Bill playing this on the Barn Dance, this is from a radio broadcast in the sixties, here you can see that Bill was the greatest accordion player to ever grace any stage.

Mary Elliott is next with a self-written tune, Honky Tonk Angel (Who Wants To Come Home) from her Blue Roses album.

Instrumental time again. This is Ron Coulthard doing an original steel guitar number called Stonetown Swing, on the fiddle is Mike Slauenwhite, another brand new recording.

Earl Heywood and The Howard Sisters team up for Pine Tree, Pine Over Me, probably the only song ever sung by this combination on the Barn Dance.

Followed by a second generation Heywood doing an old time country song, Columbus Stockade Blues, ala bluegrass style. This is quite a change for Grant Heywood, the rock and roller who's slowly but surely coming back to his country roots.

Next tune is a number from multiinstrumentalist Ken Ducharme with Tuggerman's Jig on fiddle from a 1963 broadcast of the Barn Dance.

Slim Gordon appeared on the Barn Dance as a guest a number of times, here from one of his albums, one of his own songs "Your Letters". Today Slim can be found relaxing at his home in Exeter.

Finally committed to a recording, here is Len Love and The Country Versatiles doing In The Mood from a Barn Dance Reunion in

Roy Thompson was a regular on the Barn Dance in the fifties and here is heard on a demo recording made in somebody's basement sometime in the sixties of one of Lynn Russwurm's songs, You'd Be The First To

One of our most versatile musicians is Al Widmeyer showing what he can do with a bluegrass instrumental. Al plays dobro, flat top guitar, mandolin and electric bass on this one, The Wabash Cannonball.

Shutters and Boards with Alfie Fromager, the King Of Country Music in the Owen Sound area ... This is from one of his Circle M albums.

Don Robertson and The Ranch Boys Quartet on an old Sons Of The Pioneer's number, 160 Acres. The quartet comprised of Don, Ernie King, Reg Bitton and Rossie Mann.

Barn Dance! - a fiddle tune written and recorded especially for this album by Mike Slauenwhite of the Barn Dance Band.

Larry Mercey sings an original off his first album from his post Mercey Brothers days, If I Had My Life To Love Over.

Here is another one by the great Bill

Mankiss, this time accompanied by Lucky Ambo and Victor Pasowisty. South is from a sixties radio broadcast.

Lamp Lighting Time In The Valley as sung by Hank MacDonald. This is taken from an album Hank recorded for Rodeo records in 1989. Hank is one of the old Barn Dance


We're particularly proud of this one. Blue Shadows On The Trail was recorded as a demo at CKNX in 1947 by Jean and Les Dowell with Maurice Bolyer on guitar. In 1998 we brought the Colorado Kids back into a studio to do Chime Bells and they haven't really changed all that much in 51 years ...

Hank Bedard sings Sophronie in bluegrass style with Kelly Daum on 5-string banjo along with the Ranch Boys. From a Barn Dance broadcast.

This is an extremely rare item in that the introduction to the song is delivered by none other than Doc Cruikshank. It's the Seiler Twins singing Until I Lost You with Hap Swatridge on accordion from a 50's broadcast, the girls don't even remember singing

Flop Eared Mule, Al was one of the best known fiddle players of all time, thanks to his long tenure with the Tommy Hunter Show on CBC-TV.

Lynn Russwurm, singing one of his own songs. Laura and Lynn, The Pine River Sweethearts appeared many times on the Barn Dance in the 50's and today Lynn is at the helm of the Barn Dance Band. The song is Many Mansions.

And here is the other half of the Pine River Sweethearts, Laura Russwurm singing one of her own songs, Little Gal With A Love That Shows, with the Laurie Bower Singers.

One of the earliest fiddlers on the Barn Dance, Clare Adlam plays his own tune, Spring Valley Jig.

Johnny Siska and the Westernaires from a guest spot on the Barn Dance in 1954 doing Skirts, with Mike Slauenwhite on the lead vocal, assisted by Johnny Siska and Brian Dugan.

We close off with I Saw The Light by Hughie and Linda Elder doing the obligatory closing number of a gospel song, their first experience in a studio in 1998.

I would like to mention that the 1998 studio cuts were done in Uncle Gerry's Studio in Kitchener, with Gary Hintz driving the train.

She's a great yodeller and most of her albums feature her yodeling and western songs, she attends many of the cowboy and western conventions every year in the western U.S. as well as cowboy poet gatherings. This is a fascinating branch of country music that deserves to be better known. The songs by Lynn on her album are "Eagle On The Mountain" and "Ricochet Yodel" which Shirley co-wrote with Lynn. Many of you may remember Shirley from her days on the road when one of her major stops was the Twin Gables Hotel in Listowel with the "Shirley Field Show".
