

Howdy Folks:

Oh hum, Oh my, it is 1998 and how the time flies. Would you believe it if I told you I was born March 12th, 1917 on a farm on Concession 2, Usborne Township, Huron County. I arrived on earth before the doctor hitched up his horse to the buggy to come to my parents' farm, and when he did arrive he told my parents there would be no grass grow under this child's feet. He was right, and I can vouch for that, for I'm still fit as a fiddle.

I first became associated with CKNX Radio and Television on a remote broadcast on a Saturday Night CKNX Barn Dance, December 5th. 1942 in the Hensall Town Hall. To make it short it was the late W. T. "Doc" Cruikshank who gave me a full time job for life in the field of broadcasting. I was involved in all facets of the business for CKNX Radio and TV, serving a vast area of communities throughout south western Ontario, lasting more than 40 years. The rest is history, valuable to the heritage of Canada and most valuable to the heritage of the many communities of the immediate area it serves. This we cannot afford to lose.

It has been difficult for me to fathom eight years have slipped by since I was one of 25 other Canadian artists nominated by an advisory board of 45 members, and honoured to be inducted into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame. The ceremonies for this event were held on November 1, 1989 in Kitchener's Centre In The Square and was televised by CKCO-TV to millions of viewers.

Immediately following this event an idea formed in my mind that I just had to pursue. It was W. T. "Doc" Cruikshank, owner of CKNX Radio and Television who had spawned more live music through his broadcasting facilities

than probably any other private Radio and Television station in Canada. All this happened right here in Huron County.

I realized I had a wealth of knowledge and experience, why not start a foundation? So I introduced my ideas to our local members of parliament and thank God I did.

Before officially forming a board of 15 Wingham residents as directors to lay the groundwork for a foundation, I had contacted my members of Parliament, advising them I was dedicating the rest of my life to create the Historical Barn Dance into a tourist attraction in Huron County. Their letters were most encouraging that I should carry on. To my surprise, Thursday evening on April 29th, 1993, I was invited to the Clinton Town Hall to attend a presentation. Here I was united with 25 other volunteer workers in Huron County to receive the Governor General of Canada Award, along with a medal. These awards were given in honour of making a significant contribution to Canada, to our community and to our fellow Canadians.

Right now, Dave Wall is coauthoring the Barn Dance Book with me, on the story of "Canada's largest Travelling Barn Dance". Hopefully we may be able to launch this publication sometime in 1999. The story will cover the Life and Times of all the people connected to the Barn Dance, and those who performed on radio and TV at CKNX. We do need help, editing and laying out the book. Anyone interested in giving us a hand, please drop me a line, or phone (519) 357-2355. We're also looking for more memorabilia.

Remember, the show must go on.

The Rankin Family from Mabou, Nova Scotia had a busy summer in 1997. After recording their Christmas Album early in the year they were off to New York to appear on a highly syndicated public radio show that is heard on over 400 radio stations in North America. Throughout August, they appeared at the Big Valley Jamboree in Camrose. Alberta and a concert in the Alpine Bowl in Whistler, B.C. Then heading east, they played dates in Toronto and Ottawa in Ontario, and finally wound up in Hawkesbury, Cape Breton, N.S. The Halifax Herald sponsored the show, with a fabulous crowd in honour of the Rankin Family, where the fame began. They will embark on another tour in the spring of 1998.



According to the charts, Quality recording artist Grant Heywood and the Desert Dolphins continue to receive airplay across the nation.
