Johnny Brent - 1921 - 2001 Barn Dance Ambassador, Manager and Emcee

I was just about to visit Johnny Brent for an informal interview at the Wingham Hospital, when I was suddenly told of his passing away just hours before. I've known others in the entertainment field, who like Johnny had a real 'presence of character' and were enthusiastic, energetic and just all around likeable. It's hard to believe when they are no longer around, but on the other hand, it is equally as easy to remember them because they were well-known public figures.

Johnny loved people, and he loved the Barn Dance as much as being a part of it. It was Johnny Brent who coined the phrase, "Canada's Largest Travelling Barn Dance". I, personally will always remember his zest for living and entertaining. Johnny was a real showman and in my mind was "Mr. Barn Dance". Here is a transcript excerpt about Johnny, compiled by my father, Earl Heywood, and David Wall from a soon to be published book chronicling the history of Canada's Largest Travelling Barn Dance.

Johnny Brent was born October 24, 1921 in the village of Bamberg, Ont., Waterloo County. He came from a family

> of ten including his mother, father, four boys and four girls. The family moved to Waterloo, Ont. when Johnny was six months old. He got his education at St. Louis School in Waterloo, Jerome's College in Kitchener, Kitchener Collegiate Vocational and School, graduating with a degree in Commercial Administration.

Johnny participated in football, basketball, baseball and boxing. He played Junior 'B' to Senior 'A' hockey, and in 1970 he became an executive member of the Ontario Hockey Asso-


ciation.

Johnny remembered 'The Depression' in the early '30's and learned much from it. He took many part-time jobs such as delivering newspapers, caddying at a golf club, exercising race horses, teaching riding and doing other odd jobs wherever available.

Johnny Brent's career in the entertainment field started at an early age. His coming from a musical family enabled him to help form a Country and Western Group known as "The Wyoming Hillbillies". He fronted the band as emcee and vocalist. The group ranged in age from ten to fourteen years of age. They gained prominence by entertaining for parties, business corporations, church socials, dances and other events.

His entertainment career took a big step forward when the owner of Radio Station CKCR (now CHYM) in Kitchener offered Johnny a position as an announcer in 1938. He took a six month training course without pay, and at seventeen Johnny hit the broadcasting airwayes

It was 1940 when "Doc" Cruick-shank hired Johnny as the "Voice of Community Service" for CKNX radio in Wingham. He soon became the "Morning Man" at 6:30 a.m., for nineteen years. As well as other programming duties he soon took a shine to "The CKNX Barn Dance" which "Doc" presented live from the studios every Saturday night. Talented local musicians and vocalists were featured and it wasn't long before "Doc" turned over complete responsibility of the program to

Sadly, we will all miss two more pioneers who passed on just recently this past January. Johnny Brent, original M.C. and host of many, if not most of the original CKNX Barn Dance shows. As well, Victor Pasowisty, fiddle player extraordinaire, member of the Barn Dance Band, and personal friend, will most certainly leave shoes that will be hard to fill. They will be remembered and honoured for their contribution of smiles, fine music, and memories

Carol Johnston and brother Wayne Schultz are hoping to follow up last years release, with some more old time and classic country favourites.

The Heywood Family 'Three Generations' including the Heywood Twins, will be in the studio soon to record some country gospel, some of Earl's unrecorded original cowboy songs, as well as others.

'Little Johnny Heaman' and his wife Geneva will be recording their very first CD / tape later this year, and it will be a testament to 'real country music'.

I haven't spoken to him recently, but no doubt fiddle player, Randy Morrison will be working on a new release for this year as well.

The Barn Dance Volume 3, is currently being compiled, with vintage live cuts from the old Barn Dance days as well as some new live material and studio tracks. This is a monumental task to put this together, and requires good ears, and a lot of time and patience. We will certainly let you know when it become available.

Barn Dance Band loses one of the Best. We remember Canadian Fiddle Champion -Victor Pasowisty.

BRENT, John Francis - at Wingham and District Hospital, Wingham, on Sunday, Jan. 14, 2001, Johnny Brent, of Wroxeter, 26 years (1941 to 1967) as a radio and television personality with CKNX in Wingham and one of the original pioneers and Master of Ceremonies of the CKNX Barn Dance, has passed away, in his 80th

Johnny Brent. Johnny consulted with "Doc" about taking the Barn Dance show to the outlying communities and broadcast the performance live to radio. The Barn Dance show and dance that emanated from so many different municipalities, soon became a regular feature on CKNX Radio for the next 26 years.

As its popularity grew, so did the calibre of entertainers to be embraced by professional talent from east to west coasts of Canada, plus artists from the Grand Ole Opry, in Nashville, Tenn., including Bill Munroe and the Bluegrass Boys, Wilma Lee & Stoney Cooper, Max Wiseman and others. Many former regular performers on the Barn Dance who have left their mark in the music field include: The Mercey Brothers, Maurice Bolyer, Ward Allen, Earl Heywood, Al Cherny, Gordie Tapp, Tommy Hunter, Gordon Lightfoot, Graham Townsend, The Ranch Boys, Slim Boucher & The Golden Prairie Cowboys, and many others who contributed to the success of "Canada's Largest Barn Dance" and made Johnny's job of emcee / manager such a labour of love.

Johnny was a part of CKNX Television, when it came about, and was on such shows as Focus, M'Lady, CKNX Sports, Circle 8 Ranch and Special Events. As well as a referee for hockey

games, he booked talent for celebrations in many communities, and was also emcee for many fall fairs, fiddle and step dancing programs in Western Ontario. He was chairman of Wingham's 75th Birthday Celebration, a representative for the C.N.I.B., a vice-president of the Young Progressive Conservatives, and a member of the Kinsmen Club and other organizations, not to mention an executive member of the Barn Dance Historical Foundation.

In 1968, Johnny left CKNX and accepted a position as sales representative with Canadian Breweries. By 1970 he worked in real estate until his retirement in 1995. Johnny said, "I've had a full and busy life, but probably would do it all over again."

Johnny Brent received an award from the Barn Dance Hall of Fame Historical Foundation, on Sunday, Sept. 18, 1994, as the first celebrity to be so honoured in recognition of his creation of the title, "Canada's Largest Travelling Barn Dance." Johnny was respected and loved by many, and that feeling was mutual, especially when his wife, Roberta, family and friends turned out last year, at the annual Barn Dance May Campout Weekend in Blyth, Ont. to see Johnny receive the "Pioneer Award" from his long time friend, Earl Heywood. It was like one big happy family gathering, and Johnny

loved his family.

As long as the Barn Dance is alive, you'll always hear this intro: "From coast to coast. People like old time music most. It's time for another (CKNX) Saturday night Barn Dance.", and the memory of Johnny Brent will always carry on with every show.





HOWDY FOLKS:

Looking back and reviewing some of our accomplishments of the year 2000 we have now honoured over 40 Barn Dance artists with a Pioneer Award that are now on display in our museum. Many more will receive this honour.

On Sunday, October 15, 2000, Canada's Largest Travelling Barn Dance appeared on the stage of the Heritage Theatre in Wingham. The highlight of this performance was the unveiling of a special large plaque, and framed photo honouring the founding member of a foundation which became the Barn Society and Dance Historical Entertainment Museum. These were the people who adapted a plan and spent two years in laying the ground work to create a Centre for the Arts, and Entertainment Museum, and "Canada's Largest resurrect Travelling Barn Dance."

Here are the people who were honoured on this plaque. First the Advisory Board - Gerald W. "Bud" of "Doc" Cruickshank. son Cruickshank; Ian Moreland, mayor of the town of Wingham; Johnny Brent, former Barn Dance Manager and Emcee; Bob Carbert, former CKNX member; Murray Gaunt, long time CKNX employee; H. "Hap" Swatridge, Barn Dance performer; Gary Pietrik, Wingham businessman and musician; Ken Ducharme, former CKNX employee.
