# 100 Years - A Tribute to a Canadian Fiddle Legend TOMMY McQUESTON

Tommy McQueston, a Canadian fiddle legend, passed away on February 27, 2002 in his 100th year after a brief bout with the flu. He had played for old time dances throughout Ontario with such orchestras as Norm Graham and his Harvesters, Russ Creighton and his Haybailers, and George Wade and his Cornhuskers. In the 1930s he was playing a weekly one hour program on the CBC National Radio Network with the Cornhuskers, and recorded with them for RCA on the old 78s. His day job was as a mechanic for the Toronto Transit Commission where he worked for 39 years.

Tommy was born and raised in Ballymoney, County Antrim, Northern Ireland, an area known for its old-time fiddlers. One of these, James Patterson, started Tommy off in the oral tradition but he soon moved on to Billy Clark who taught him how to read music. Tommy was just six years of age when he began his lessons and was playing for dances by the time he was 10, after three years with Billy Clark.

When he emigrated to Canada in 1924, Tommy took further lessons for three and one half years at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto and was again playing for dances in 1929 as knowledge of his fiddle playing spread. Besides the usual jigs, reels, hornpipes and country dances, Tommy was also a master of the Scottish pastoral airs and strathspeys, and played them all with his skillful and distinct style of bowing. In his own words from an interview I had with him some years ago, Tommy said: "What I do with the bow is traditional over there (Ireland). They snap the bow, we call it a cut. But we play four notes in its execution." Tommy's rhythm and timing was so flawless that the dancers' feet would respond almost involuntarily.

Tommy liked to test his skills in competition and became well known in contest circles.

He has won more than 100 trophies through the years and donated 75 of these, along with a fiddle and bow, to the King Township museum not far from his home in King City, Ontario.

Over the years, Tommy taught a number of aspiring young fiddle players, the most notable being the undefeated Canadian and North American fiddle champion, the late Graham Townsend, who always held his former teacher in the highest regard. "He should have recorded his own fiddle album," Graham once said, "He's a much better fiddle player than some who have recorded albums.' Tommy taught Graham for about two and one half years, beginning when Graham was about seven years old. His father brought him, Tommy said. because of Graham's poor eyesight Tommy would write out the notes in an oversized notation but as Tommy said, "Graham would

learn mostly by ear and have two jigs and a reel off perfect each week."

Tommy was playing almost to the end. In his later years when his fingering arm became too sore for a 4 hour stretch of playing at dances his wife, Janet, (artist and Scottish country dancer) rigged up a resting pad on a camera tripod to keep him going. As always, the fiddle and Tommy were one as reflected in his facial expressions of joy. Although he didn't record a fiddle album, some of us. including this writer who played backup piano with Tommy

for many years, can take comfort in our own amateur recording to relive some of those precious moments.

Tommy was inducted into the Canadian Fiddlers Hall of Fame in 1987, at a ceremony held in St. Catherines, Ont. with honoured Grammy award winning accordion player, Walter Ostenak attending as a presenter.

The writer, Lorne Greenwood, has received numerous awards in the old time country music field. He was presented with the "Pauline McGibbon Life Achievement In The Arts Award" in 1996 and was inducted into "America's Old Time Country Music Hall of Fame" in 2001.



This time around we're going to take a look at yodellers. Yodelling has always been a strong part of country music since Jimmie Rodgers laid down his first tracks in 1927. Although he saved his "Blue Yodel" till his second session, figuring to get a foothold first and then hit them with his ace in the hole. And he was right, when "Blue Yodel" was released it took the country by storm. There had been a few yodellers before Jimmie, they were very crude compared to the great Jimmie Rodgers. He took yodelling to heights that were never dreamed of before and inspired many to follow in his footsteps.

One of these was a contemporary by the name of Gene Autry. Gene covered most of Jimmie's releases interspersed with some of his own songs for several years until he hit the jackpot with his own "Silver Haired Daddy of Mine". Thereafter the covers became less frequent and after he hit the silver screen, Gene was his own man. He was a regular on the National Barn Dance, which was owned by Sears-Roebuck, who gave Gene a tremendous boost in their catalogues by selling millions of his Conqueror records which they owned. From there it was a simple step into the movies in Republic Pictures which was also tied in with Sears-Roebuck.

Other yodellers of the day included Jimmie Davis, Cliff Carlisle, Stuart Hamblen, and many more. Also, many of these paid tribute to Jimmie Rodgers after his death on record with such songs as "The Death of Jimmie Rodgers", "When Jimmie Rodgers said Goodbye". Then along came a young Texan who recorded "The Passing of Jim-

mie Rodgers" and "The Last Thoughts of Jimmie Rodgers". On this recording Mrs. Rodgers gave him Jimmie's own guitar to use on the recording. This young man's name was Ernest Tubb, complete with a Jimmie Rodgers style yodel, however his record didn't stir up much attention and he had to wait a few more years for stardom until he hit big with "Walking the Floor Over Your", although he did manage to co-star in several movies with Charles Starrett, The Durango Kid. Ernest lost his ability to yodel when he had his tonsils removed.

There was another young yodeller working out of California with "The Original Beverly Hillbillies" that was becoming very popular on radio and personal appearance even though he was still in his teens. At one point Jimmie Rodgers happened to hear him and brought word back to his A & R man with RCA along with the statement that this young yodeller would "make bums out of us all". Well this young singer was Elton Britt and he did turn yodelling upside down with his fancy and high yodelling that were pretty hard to surpass. He had a big hit with "Chime Bells" among others, but his biggest hit by far was a 1942 war song "There's A Star Spangled Banner Waving Somewhere" which was the first official country music million seller.

Patsy Montana, one of the earliest female yodellers was also a member of the National Barn Dance out of WLS in Chicago who did extensive work with The Prairie Ramblers. She composed and recorded "I Want to be a Cowboy's Sweetheart" which also was a million seller, although unofficial, since there was no such thing until later. Many of today's female country singers use this as a stepping stone today to get a foothold in the business such as Suzy Boggus and Leanne Rimes. Other female yodellers included Rosalie Allen who recorded many yodelling duets with Elton Britt and was host to a highly popular radio show, emanating out of New York City. Some of our other great country stars yodelled in the early stages of their career such as Red Foley, who was an excellent yodeller, Rex Allen, one of the greatest who later played Frontier Doctor on his own TV series. Both these artists were also with the

National Barn Dance, which was really the hotbed of pure country music, even more so that the Grand Ole Opry in the early days. Then there was Leonard Slye, with the Sons of the Pioneers who did a lot of yodelling on records and transcriptions with the early Sons, of course he became known as Roy Rogers, The King of the Cowboys. Then along came Kenny Roberts who replaced Bill Haley with the Downhomers. Kenny was probably the fastest of the trick yodellers of all, and is still active today.

Here in Canada we had some great yodellers who could hold their own with any of the yodellers from south of the border. Several were stars on our own CKNX Barn Dance. Who could ever forget Jack Kingston and his "Yodelling Cowboy". When Earl Heywood went on tour across the east part of Canada in 1952, Jack's featured song on all the shows was a song I had written for him called "Song of the Yodelling Bells". Jack put a yodel with it and performed it every night on the tour, one of my great regrets is that Jack never got to record this song. Although she had a reasonably short stay with the Barn Dance, young Terry Parker was a superb yodeller and you can hear her on "It's The Saturday Night Barn Dance Vol. 1", singing "Wide Rolling Plains" and you'll see what I mean. Then there was Donn Reynolds, who made a number of appearances on the show, who is in the Guinness Book of Records for World's Highest Yodeler, and for yodelling longer than anyone else. Other Canadian yodellers would include Shirley Field, who has won many awards for yodelling, here and in the U.S. Even today Shirley can be found at Cowboy and Yodelling festivals all across North America. At one time in the 1970's, The Shirley Field Show was a regular mainstay in this area such as the Listowel Twin Gables, The Hanover Inn and many other stops across Canada.

That about takes all my space for this time, and next time I think we'll take a further look at yodelling and maybe go across the sea to Australia and other places,



Membership chairperson David Hedley noted that our membership has remained fairly static over the years of our operation. Grant Heywood gave an overview of our newsletter, asking for comments or suggestions. Verna Steffler reported that we will be producing a coloured brochure re our Museum as soon as our new location is finalized. We will have displays at the Wingham Singing Contest in July and at the Blyth Threshers Reunion in September.

Two new CDs /tapes will be available shortly - Barn Dance Vol. 3; and one featuring previously unreleased fiddle music by the late Al Cherny.

After nominations and elections were handled at the General Meeting, and officers decided at the meeting of the new Board, our slate for 2002 is: President - Shirley Russwurm; 1st VP - Wayne Otterbein; 2nd VP - Grant Heywood; Secretary - Ron Coulthard; Treasurer - Gordon Baxter; Directors - Earl Heywood (founder), John Heaman, Bill Simmermaker, Verna Steffler, David Hedley, Doug Dietrich and David Wall. (David replaces Lynn Russwurm, who continues to be a vital contributor to our operation, but did not stand for re-election.)
