Al Widmeyer ... Country Music ... & Stompin' Tom

Some people are lucky enough to play in one or two bands and maybe play a couple of instruments and sing. Al Widmeyer is an anomaly in that department. Born in Hanover, Ont., Al got his foothold with the John Ham Band from London, It wasn't long before he made his mark with the infamous bluegrass band The Dixie Flyers. He continued playing the circuit and touring with the likes of Paul Weber & Top Hand, Joe Firth & The Promised Land, The BW Pauley Roadshow, Carl Kees & The Golden Fiddle Music Co., The Country Versatiles and Stompin' Tom Connors. That's a profound education in traditional bluegrass and country music that would undoubtedly take years of study at any college institution, and that doesn't even include many others that I've likely missed.

Al's wife, Sue, is the daughter of the late *Hughie Elder* of the *CKNX Ranch Boys* & *Barn Dance Band*. So if you're going to have a father in law it

might as well be someone you can take pride in looking up to. And if you're going to play a musical instrument, then you might as well try your hand at almost everything. Al is a fine dobro player, bass player and guitar picker. But he can also turn around and play fiddle, mandolin and steel if he puts his mind to it. He's been part of countless recording projects including, Paul Weber, The Heywood Family, and so many more. Al also had a big part in the last two Stompin' Tom CDs.

Al is a traditionalist when it comes to playing country music. He has a huge collection of music from Lefty Frizzel to his dobro idol, the late Josh Graves. It was the late Ernie King (CKNX Ranch Boys) who made the first custom 'King' dobro for Al. Back in the day when real country music was more prevalent, Al had a single titled 'Honky Tonk Saturday Night' that got a lot of radio play. When he's not singin' and pickin', Al & Sue often take off to bluegrass jams and festivals in Canada and south

border. And he usually ends up pickin' & singin' there anyway. It was on one of his trips to visit his pickin' buddy in Louisville, Kentucky that Al became an official Kentucky Colonel ya'll. Besides playing on the occasional Barn Dance, Al also received the Barn Dance Pioneer Award.

Needless to say, Al caught the attention of the late Canadian legend, Stompin' Tom Connors. Al became part of the band but even more important-

ly, he became a very good friend of the legendary icon. Al has done approximately 4 cross Canada tours with Tom including the Calgary Stampede, the Ottawa Scotiabank Centre and many other high profile venues. Tom Jr. was Stompin' Tom's road manager and they all travelled in a couple of Chevy Suburbans. Stompin' Tom shared the values of the common man in his music and when I asked Al about the accommodations on many of their road tours, Al told me they usually stayed in cheap, but clean motels. Nothin' fancy, and that's just the way Tom wanted it.

I've heard the stories about Tom from previous tours and bands when he would stop the vehicles somewhere out in farm country Saskatchewan and set up the equipment and play in an adjacent wheat field just for the hell of it. But Al wasn't about to let me in on too much of that. Safe to say that there was always a lot of Moosehead beer on every tour and there was always one roadie designated to



keep the supply topped up and cold. On the last tour with *Stompin' Tom*, Al got to play with one of the original band members of Tom's band, Mickey Andrews. Mickey played slide/steel guitar, and was responsible for such sound effects as the police siren on *'Bud the Spud'*.

I asked Al which Stompin' Tom songs were his favourites ... he said "all of them". One of Tom's favourite songs was 'These Men With Broken Hearts'. Al was with Tom a lot and visited him at his house on a regular basis. He told me some of the most memorable moments (other than being on stage with 'the man') was being featured with the Stanley Cup, when Tom was honoured with his likeness on a Canadian postage stamp, and just playing to appreciative Canadian audiences at large venues.

It was a major blow to Al when Tom passed away on March 6th, 2013. Al was taken aback by the huge outpouring from everyone across Canada at Tom's televised funeral. Al was especially proud to be onstage with fellow bandmate Tim Hus who honoured Tom with a song that sad day.

These days, Al still follows his musical journey as a band member at the Purple Hill Country Shows, and every 2nd Wed. night playing bluegrass at Paul Weber's Tavern in Maryhill. Often times you can catch him as a featured performer or just 'one of the guys' in any bluegrass or country band, onstage or in session ... or just driving bus for KW Transit. But I do know that AI will always have fond memories of his stint with his good friend ,Stompin' Tom. I asked him if Tom ever said anything that stuck in his head. "Oh yeah", Al said, "I'll never forget when Tom said to me ... You know Widmeyer, I wish I'd known you a long time ago." What more can you say.

BARN DANCE MUSEUM

A visit to the Barn Dance Museum shows people the rich musical history of the area through the years. Some artists who performed on the Barn Dance went on to both national and international fame. The Barn Dance Museum first opened in the Wingham Armouries in April 1996. In seven short years the museum outgrew its first home and was moved to the present location during 2003 in the basement of the North Huron Museum at 273 Josephine Street, Wingham. In the nearly two decades of operation exhibits have come to include many items connected with artists who performed on the Barn Dance both in the past and present, CKNX radio and television, in the Wingham area and Southwestern Ontario in general. A recent addition is the Jimmy Phair display of stage clothing, photos and CDs. There is stage clothing worn by the Ranch Boys, Earl and Martha Heywood, Wayne Riehl, as well as other performers. Gold records presented to the Mercey Brothers and Al Cherny and the first Shelburne Fiddle Contest cup presented to Mel Lavigne are among the unique items on display. Musical instruments such as acoustic guitars, steel guitars and fiddles used during the careers of some of the musicians are exhibited. Photos show many of the area performers. The museums are open regular hours during the summer months and may be visited by appointment at other times of the year.

I've been attending the bluegrass concerts at the Galt Legion and I've been impressed by the high caliber of bluegrass that have appeared at these venues. Every winter Tony DeBoer from River Valley Bluegrass festivals has been setting up three series of bluegrass concerts in Feb., Mar. and April, bringing in top bluegrass groups for about a week each time, including the Cambridge stop.

While the April concerts are yet to come, the February concerts with The Crowe Brothers from the U.S. were great concerts but with low attendance, due to bad weather.


However the March concert with The Spinney Brothers from Nova Scotia was well attended and what a great concert that was. In my books the Spinney Brothers gave the best performance I've ever seen in bluegrass. Musicianship, they showed that bluegrass doesn't have to be played at break-neck speed but they also showed that they can. Brothers Allan on guitar and Rick on 5-string banjo don't have to take a back seat from anyone. Spotlighting their beautiful 4part harmonies, assisted by mandolinist Gary Dalrymple and bassist Terry Poirier, who incidentally is a son of Canadian bluegrass legend Eddy Poirier. What also sets them apart is their adaptation of country music, songs of Marty Robbins, Merle Haggard, etc. I really enjoyed their rendition of "I want My Dog Back"

which was written especially for them by Tom T. Hall. This song is included on one of their CDs which are released Stateside by Mountain Fever Records in Virginia.

Opening acts for both concerts were also excellent with Rescue Junction doing the honours in February and Unseen Strangers opening for The Spinney Brothers.

The April concert will spotlight Larry Efaw and The Bluegrass Mountaineers from the U.S. Of special interest will be the opening act of The Commercial Bluegrass Band. These guys are an allstar band that was formed to play at Paul Weber's Commercial Tavern in Maryhill every second Tuesday and have also performed at other venues. The band consists of Al Widmeyer on dobro and flat-top guitar, Al is versatile on many stringed instruments and performed for a number of years with Stompin' Tom Connors; Dicky Dugal on flat-top guitar and vocals and travels with Randy Morrison and Flatt River, as well as with country band U-Turn; Glenn George on stand-up bass, Glenn is a member of the bluegrass band, The Barn Katz and country band, Rural Appetite; Dan Howlett on fiddle, a chore he also handles with the Western Swing Authority; and Ken Groomes, award winning banjo player with Traditionally Wound. By the way, Glenn is also president of the Waterloo-Wellington Bluegrass Association.

Be sure to hear these guys at the Galt Legion or at the Commercial Tavern in Maryhill.

It's a long y from Millbank to Goshen, Indiana, but s is where their musical tastes come toher in the bluegrass idiom. Moving to Inna for a five year sojourn with their family, young brother and sister began to realize ir dream. Kyle discovered the mandolin d Kaitlyn made use of the guitar she had en playing from a young age on. Laying groundwork for a career, they spent the nmer of 2008 in Nashville where Kyle died vocals and arranging while Kaitlyn ncentrated on song-writing.

I met this young couple when I filled in h Redwood Hill for a couple of gigs in Milton and was quite impressed with their fessionalism. Since then I've heard noth-but praise for Rescue Junction.

In 2009, they set about putting together group to complement their music. Roger rtin was added on 5-string banjo. He me from a musical family in Pennsylvania, rried a Canadian girl and stayed in Canato add his harmony vocals to the mix. For about a year of working as a trio, they ded Dallas Roth on stand-up bass and the key vocals to come up with some beaul four-part harmonies. Dallas came out of lassical background. And now the sound is complete.

Demand for their services came from ny areas. Churches and bluegrass festis have kept the group quite busy. After ng spotlighted at our Sunday morning spel gathering in Blyth last year, they will featured on our Friday night bluegrass neert.

In spite of a busy schedule, they found e to record 2 CDs of their music with ch of the material coming from the pen of the typ Gerber. Their talents have been rechized by their peers in the bluegrass instry with nominations in several categos at last year's awards show at Deerhurst Hunstville last fall. They walked away with well-earned "Most Promising Group" ard. When you see this group you will ree, "This is only The Beginning".

BARN DANCE CORNER

I don't know what I expect of Nash-

Now, if I were only talking about Nashville as the engine and face of commercial country music, I would have no shortage of hopes, dreams, and expectations. Not to mention a bucket of plain old opinions: Keep it country! Honour the past! The music has to change or it will

I understand Nashville as a myth and as an idea.

But what about Nashville as a place, an actual city full of real people leading normal lives? A place where, in fact, country music may not be as important to the average resident as I might like to

I am about to find out.

Admittedly, I have been to Nashville only once before. The mid-south city on the Cumberland River has no real claim to me. I know it is smaller than my imagination and memory may suggest. The city population hovers around the 650,000 person mark. A satellite radio DJ on Sirius XM Prime Country was reminding tourists who visit, that the city just isn't that big. Three days is a perfectly adequate amount of time to experience what it has to offer.

My first and only time in Nashville was back in 1996. Garth Brooks was still changing country music forever. Artists like Pam Tillis and Aaron Tippin still mattered enough to make the covers of country music magazines. (It seems odd today that the publishing industry even offered a range of publications covering country music when the genre now depends exclusively on "Country Weekly" for its news and entertainment.)

A saved Citibank Visa credit card receipt provides an interesting window into what once was. The Tower Records where I remember eagerly purchasing all the new Dead Reckoning cassette tapes is gone. Something purchased at a location identified as "Conway Twitty Country;" is no doubt gone. I know Twitty City closed its doors in 1994.

As much as I am interested in seeing how the city has changed and redefined itself, I know I will also gladly indulge nostalgia. There is no reason to think I will not revisit the Ernest Tubb Record Shop, the Ryman Auditorium, and The Loveless Cafe for its hot biscuits and country ham. I certainly have every intention of spending as much time as possible in the landmark Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum which opened back in 2001. I can only imagine the sense of loss that will wash over me as I take in the Hall of Fame Members bronze bas-relief plagues displayed in the Hall of Fame Rotunda. The past years have seen a stream of ships go out.

Even so, with all the change, Nashville has not fully torn up its tracks to the past. Sure there is an NHL hockey franchise playing downtown and the Opry ain't, but I get the sense that Nashville will provide what I need and want of it.

I expect Nashville to still be a city of good ghosts and dreams.
