Getting to know: Doug Dietrich, Steel Guitar, Dobro & More

Being a great steel guitarist and a nice guy seem to go together. Doug Dietrich is no exception. As Barn Dance musical director, Doug is constantly striving to keep each show unique, with some of the best talent around. Doug was brought up in a musical environment at home and this is a brief portrayal of his life in music, and more.

Doug was born in 1951, in Waterloo, the night his dad was playing fiddle on a job. His dad just got to the hospital in time to witness the event. As a youngster, Doug fondly remembers relatives & friends jamming around the Dietrich house. A lot of his father's musical friends, Earl Fries, Karl Kees, Gord Affeldt, were a big influence on Doug. Before learning on his own, he took lessons for almost a year on Hawaiian guitar. (no pedals) Doug also plays, guitar, bass, & dobro, and it was his dad's home built steel, via Gord Affeldt, that really got him started. Once Doug became a steel guitarist, his radio influences became apparent, with such greats as Buck Owens steel player Ralph Mooney, then Tom Brumley, Lloyd Green and Buddy Emmons.

Early on Doug played with the Rhythm Ramblers, The Galaxies and then joined Sunrise in 1985, and they're still going strong. He has performed with Randy Satchell, Paul Weber, Bill Murray, and Terry Sumsion, to Larry Mercey, Carrol Baker, Johnny Burke, Marie Bottrell, Harold McIntyre, and countless others. Along with Grant Heywood, Doug also toured with Rick Jones in the U.S. & Canada, opening for the Bellamy Bros. in Minnesota. It was also a privilege when Doug became a regular member of the theatrical tribute show, 'Hank Williams'

Live 1952', touring across Canada several times. The show features Joe Matheson, (of Jersey Boys fame). Joe plays the role of Hank Williams at a 'would be' last performance of Hank. Doug says, "It's definitely a high end gig." But he really loves playing Barn Dance Shows, simply because of the great people he gets to work with. Playing with George Hamilton IV, Stompin' Tom, and Gordie Tapp are right up there as well.

Doug & wife Tracey have been married 41 yrs., blessed with 3 children & 5 grandchildren. Tracey is Doug's biggest inspiration/supporter, and both Doug & Tracey love spending time with family and grandchildren. Doug had a high profile job in the investment/bond division of Mutual Life/Sun Life for most of his career and now works for Equitable Life 3 days a week. Doug & Tracey's love for hockey is no secret since their son is active in coaching, playing, and owning a hockey school. It's never a dull moment when it's ice time. Besides hockey, Doug

& Tracey have met many country stars in their travels, such as, Vince Gill, Reba McIntyre, Marty Stuart, & Connie Smith.

Doug played Sho Bud steel guitars for quite a while before switching, (thru Al Brisco), to Carter steel guitars made in Texas (of which Doug has two). Carter steels are lighter in weight, which suited Doug, and with Al Brisco, he knew he'd have ongoing service and support. Doug was honoured when he was asked to work at the Carter Steel

Guitar booth at the International Steel Guitar Convention in St. Louis for a few years. I can only imagine, but I'm sure for Doug, it was the job of a lifetime, getting to meet several of his steel guitar heroes through this connection. That had to be the ultimate dream gig.

Over the years, Doug has played on various recordings including, Randy Satchell, Paul Weber, Jimmy Phair, The Heywood Family, John & Geneva Heaman, Lynn Russwurm, Al Widmeyer, Bill Murray, Wayne Diebold, Al Huiser, Kevin Westphal, Cheryl Lescom, and many others. Also, Doug played and coproduced with Grant Heywood, on Tom & Rose Merrigan's c.d. and had some of his original songs recorded by Randy Satchell, Bonita Mercer and Roger Quick. In 2005, Doug was honoured to receive the Barn Dance Pioneer Award.

Carrying on the legacy of the Barn Dance with the people and music, has allowed Doug to interact with a larger circle



There is no doubt that Doug is a wonderful steel guitar player, as I can attest to that every time I perform with him on stage. He is also a wonderful person and I consider him one of my best friends. Doug is a no-attitude, nononsense, professional musician, and says, "it's never work playing ... as long as it continues to be enjoyable."

The Barn Katz is a fun-loving and energetic group made up of some of Ontario's very finest and most experienced Bluegrass musicians.

Based out of southern Ontario, the band consists of Glenn George from Kitchener, playing both upright and electric bass. Glenn has been twice nominated as Bass Player of the year at the Canadian Central Bluegrass Awards. (C.C.B.A.) Glenn is well known for an enthusiastic stage presence, smiling face and bass played the way its suppose to be.

Multi-instrumentalist Geoff Sommers currently resides in Cambridge. Geoff has been away from Bluegrass for a few years but has returned to take up the guitar duties with the Katz. Geoff also plays fiddle and mandolin and was a founding member of popular Ontario bluegrass band, Blue Mule. (C.C.B.A. 5 time Band of the Year) He has won two Juno Awards for his work with Roots artist David Fancey.

Five time C.C.B.A. Fiddle Player of the Year Wayne Ferguson from Graven-hurst can saw up a storm on a fast fiddle tune or play soft and sweet on a heartfelt slow song. Wayne can also pick the frets right off the Mandolin and is a 4 time recipient of the Mandolin Player of the Year Award again with the C.C.B.A. Wayne is a highly sought after and can also be found playing stints with the Good Broth-

ers and Rick Jones's Allan Jackson Tribute Shows.



She has written for and co-written music with the late Terry Sumsion. To the stage Sue brings incredible singing with a passion and enthusiasm that you just don't see and hear every day. For Suzie, it's all about the love.

The tallest member of the group is the hilariously funny but oh so talented Tim McDonald. Originally from Calander, now making his home in Burlington, Tim was in one of Ontario's most prestigious bluegrass bands McDonald Bluegrass. For the Barn Katz, Tim brings incredible song writing, a richly warm baritone and a deep resonating bass vocal with a percussive banjo style that has earned him three wins as Banjo Player of the Year at the C.C.B.A. as well as a Composer of the Year Award too.

The band's first CD "Road Kill Grill" was runner up in the Alt/Country category at the Hamilton Music Awards in 2013. It features all original music and conveys an energy and sound more closely found in a top Bluegrass act.

This fine litter of musicians have escaped the barn and are out on the prowl. They are sure to entertain and delight you with their fresh brand of bluegrass. Be sure to catch them where ever they play!

Friday, so that's an extra day of advertising the shows. A food wagon is in the plans as is a corporate sponsor to pay for rain dates.





'Celebrating 50 Years in Country Music"

Gerald Davidson & the Country Versatiles

by Grant Heywood Gerald Davidson & the Country Versatiles have been playing traditional country music for 50 years and are without a doubt, some of the hardest working musicians around. Originally from Plattsville, Gerald Davidson has been singing traditional country music all his life and his band, the Country Versatiles have been



through numerous changes over the years. Gerald always had some of the best players, like the late great, Len Love, Wayne Riehl, and Tony Leggio. Today the band consists of fiddler/vocalist Ashley Giles, bass/vocalist Gord Ogilvie, drummer Gerry Felker and occasionally steel player George Webb.

This CD celebrates Gerald's 50 years of performing traditional country music. There are 12 songs on this CD from shuffles to ballads and they are all gems. 'Twin Fiddles Turn Me On' works really well, and 'Dreams of a Dreamer' as well as 'I'm a Fool For Leaving' have been staples in the band's repertoire for quite some time. My favourites are the duets with Gerald & Ashley, 'Send a Message To My Heart' and 'This Time We're Going to Make It'. These two songs really put the icing on the cake when it comes to duet vocal performance.

Gerald is in fine voice on this CD as well as Ashley, and Ashley gets a chance to play some great fiddle breaks along with Doug Johnson on steel and producer Doug Deveaux on guitar, with Graig Harly on piano. The tight rhythm section of Ken Post/drums and Gord Ogilvie/bass, gives this whole production the wings to soar. This CD was recorded at Doug Deveaux's Sideman Studio's in Oshawa and Doug certainly delivered a CD that Gerald can be proud of. This is a 'real country music' disc that puts a smile on your face while driving down the highway.

Besides playing all over southwestern Ontario, Gerald will be making a guest appearance on the Barn Dance Show, Sunday, June 12th at the Commercial Tayern in Maryhill. For more information about Gerald Davidson & the Country Versatiles www.countryversatiles.com

CORNER

I am always amazed – and somewhat surprised to be honest – by the currency the musical barn dance tradition still has in mainstream Nashville. The heyday of the original radio programs like the WLS *National Barn Dance* out of Chicago, or even Music City's own *Grand Ole Opry*, was nearly sixty years ago. The TV variety shows that followed out of that radio tradition also have faded in popularity. But the legacy of those institutions lingers.

Listening to Top 30 country music today might leave die-hard traditionalists thinking something other than a legacy is lingering on the airwaves. The music of Florida Georgia Line and Sam Hunt may not pass their sniff test of what counts as country. Tuning into a country radio station today can be disorienting and confusing. I'm sure there have been any number of occasions of flustered button pushing and angry

squinting to make sure the right station has been dialed up as much of mainstream country has increasingly sounded less and less familiar.

Yet, there on page one of Nash Country Weekly's February 15, 2016 issue in the "Then & Now: This Week in Country Music" feature, a midst all the current happenings in Nashville, were two references to that rich barn dance tradition.

The first item announced a specially priced DVD from Time Life titled *Hee Haw: Kornfield Klassics*. I smiled to know that episodes from the 1970's *Hee Haw* series still mattered. What mattered even more was the first DVD featured a live performance of Loretta Lynn singing "Coal Miner's Daughter." Lynn recorded that song in 1969. Lynn, at age 83, just released her first studio album in 12 years appropriately titled *Full Circle*. Will the circle be unbroken indeed!

The second item celebrated the release of a concert-length movie titled American Saturday Night: Live From the Grand Ole Opry. Here was a film featuring performances of today's biggest stars as they honoured and shared what the *Opry* means to them today. Brad Paisley said, "The main goal of my career was to be an *Opry* member."

The old music still matters. In fact, current star and show headliner Justin Moore said, "The older you get the more you appreciate classic country. It's like the old story that you're in the truck with your dad when you're 8 years old listening to Roger Miller or Merle Haggard and you're going, 'That's the worst thing I've ever heard.' But when you're 28 years old, you appreciate it and love it yourself, and your kids are in the back seat going, "What in the crap is this?"

Just like new country confuses old-timers let's confuse some kids and bring them into the traditional country music fold by inviting them to one of the eight Barn Dance performances already booked for 2016. We owe it to them to remind them of the past. They will probably hate us for doing it, but as Justin Moore shared, they will appreciate it later.

The show must go on!
